

Happy Father's Day to all to whom that applies! And thanks for your role in helping to raise your children, for being an example for them, and along with their mothers, providing for them, protecting them, and giving the children both a nest and wings.

Credit for originating the holiday is generally given to Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, whose father, a Civil War veteran, raised her and her five siblings

after their mother died in childbirth. She is said to have had the idea in 1909 while listening to a sermon on Mother's Day, which at the time was becoming established as a holiday. Local religious leaders supported the idea, and the first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, the month of the birthday of Dodd's father. In 1924, U.S. Pres. Calvin Coolidge supported the observance, and in 1966 Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson issued a proclamation that recognized the day. It became a national holiday in 1972 when Pres. Richard Nixon signed legislation designating the third Sunday of June as Father's Day.

According to the Pew Research Center, it has become less common for dads to be their family's sole breadwinner. As of 2016, about a quarter of couples (27%) who live with children younger than age 18 were in families where only the father works. In about 6% of the homes, the father is a stav-at-home dad while the mother is the only one working outside the home. This marked a dramatic change from 1970 when almost half of these couples (47%) were in families where only the dad worked. The share of couples living in dual-earner families has risen significantly, and now comprises the majority of two-parent families with children. Most dads say they feel proud when they think about their young adult children, and they draw a direct line between their parenting and their children's successes and failures. Still, fathers are more likely than mothers to feel disconnected from their young adult children, and many fathers express a desire for more frequent communication.

This past Friday and Saturday (June 7-8), we celebrated the final moveable feasts of the Church year, the Sacred Heart of Jesus (Friday) and the Immaculate Heart of Mary (Saturday). You may not see it easily, but we have windows in the sanctuary facing each other commemorating both. Churches often have complimentary windows across from one another. See if you can discern others in our church, such as the Eucharist and the one of a pelican biting its chest to feed its chicks, a long-revered image of the sacrificial gift of the Eucharist.

Do you remember when the Rural Life Sunday Mass was held at the Leonard farm last year? This year it will be near New Prague. Next Sunday, June 23 at 1:30 pm. Location is at Fr. Michael Miller Farm - "A Taste of Heaven" (12890 70th Street West New Prague). See archspm.org and click on events to find other driving directions. The farm is between New Prague, Lonsdale, Heidelberg, and Mongomery. Join Bishop Williams at this celebration of rural life. Mass will be followed by lunch,

from the Women of Joy

THE BIGGER PICTURE

Sacred Heart of Jesus Statue

The detailed image from last week's bulletin was a closeup of the hand of Jesus pointing to His Sacred Heart. The Bigger Picture reveals it is the Sacred Heart of Jesus statue on the side altar closest to the Holy Family stained glass window and the Baptismal font. This statue has been on this side altar since this church was built in 1859. It is most likely made of plaster.

It could be said that devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus was first written about in John's Gospel when John records that during the Last Supper, he leaned back and rested his head on Jesus' heart. This sacred devotion gained further significance in the 17th century through the experiences of a French cloistered Visitation Nun, Sister Margaret Mary Alacoque. Over eighteen months, she received four visions in which Jesus revealed His Sacred Heart and expressed His desire for a feast in its honor. We celebrated the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart on June 7.






Do you know the Bigger Picture?




The Kingdom of God Is Like... Ages 3+
